

prejudices, and from conquering alienation." The essays titled "Dear White Men" and "My Dear Friend, George Bush" reflect a spirit that, without condescension, sense the woundedness and vulnerability that underlie the way many leaders use power and express bravado.

The alternative to traditional power Peavey offers is "heart politics." Heart politics involves centering on your own skills and carefully nurturing them, while avoiding "I can change the world" complexes and the trap of perfectionism. Heart

politics requires building bridges to those who are different, finding support groups, and above all being ready to change yourself even while seeking deep social change. She sees this whole serious task in the context of a creative search for beauty and loving relationships amid an aura of deep sensitivity and refreshingly good humor. In truth, there may be no more urgent agenda for anti-hunger advocates in these trying days than to pay attention to the likes of Fran Peavey.
